## Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF)

### 2025 Allocation Report

## Introduction

The *Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022* (SSARA Guidelines) require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This *SSAF Allocation Report* is the form approved by the Minister.

The information provided in this *SSAF Allocation Report* does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF expenditure reporting is a separate process and remains unchanged, more information can be found in the [Financial Statements Guidelines](#) for Table A and B providers, and in the [Financial Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP \(FVI\)](#) for all other approved providers.

## SSAF Consultation and Achievements

All projects that received SSAF funding in 2025 were based on proposals submitted and approved by the Student Services and Amenities Fee Expenditure Advisory Committee (SSAFEAC). Where surplus funds were available during the year, SSAFEAC approved additional allocations to already endorsed initiatives.

The Committee, which operates under the authority of the Vice-Chancellor, includes 50% representation from the Student Guild. It plays a central role in facilitating student engagement regarding SSAF expenditure and in overseeing the progress and outcomes of funded projects. To ensure compliance with the SSAF guidelines, the Committee received quarterly reports throughout 2025 to track spending and project achievements.

An annual survey is sent to all SSAF-paying Curtin students providing an opportunity to comment on priorities and experiences of SSAF-funded programs. The survey is generally run in May, and results considered by the SSAFEAC to inform planning and decision-making.

## **University - Library**

The University Library secured Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) funding for six initiatives in 2025, all of which had also received funding in earlier years. The projects were as follows:

1. Grammarly – AI writing assistant
2. UniPASS – Peer-Assisted Study Sessions
3. Studiosity – Online writing and study skills service
4. 24/7 Library Opening
5. Peer Academic Mentoring
6. Library Makerspace – Saturday opening hours

### **1. Grammarly**

23,000 Grammarly seats were funded by SSAF in 2025, enabling student access to a premium version of Grammarly for spelling, grammar and clarity suggestions to support academic writing. By year's end, 95% of the seats were in use, with 22,000 students signed up to the service.

As in previous years, Generative-AI suggestions were disabled in the Curtin-provided version of the tool, ensuring its appropriateness for use in the completion of assessments. In semester two, Grammarly introduced Authorship, a tool for tracking the creation of a piece of writing, which was activated within the subscription and promoted to students and staff as a useful way to increase transparency within written assessment.

### **2. UniPASS**

UniPASS, or peer-assisted study sessions, was provided within challenging first-year units to improve students' academic content knowledge, study skills, and social integration through peer-led collaborative study sessions. In 2025, UniPASS offered an average of 57 sessions across 35 units, with 1,633 students attending at least one session.

UniPASS also provides a high-level professional development and Students-as-Partners opportunity for students employed in the program as casual staff (Peer Learning Facilitators). In 2025, UniPASS employed a total of 33 casual staff who were all trained to deliver on-campus and online student-centred study sessions to their peers.

### 3. **Studiosity**

Studiosity, an online writing and study feedback service, was provided to all students enrolled in a first-year undergraduate unit in 2025, as well as students referred to the service by university support services (Student Wellbeing, Accessibility, Faculty English Language Development teams, etc.) or academic staff. 168,549 minutes of support were purchased, of which 160,121 (95%) were used. 1,669 students within the eligible cohorts used Studiosity at least once in 2025.

### 4. **Library staffing 24/7**

The TL Robertson Library, located on Curtin's Bentley campus, is open 24/7 during semester, with a range of quiet and collaborative study spaces made available to students (swipe access is required to access the building between 8pm - 8am).

SSAF funding helps cover the cost of staffing the space overnight, ensuring students have access to support for study-related needs and enhancing a sense of safety through invigilation. Headcount data, collected between 11pm - 7am, indicates over 34,500 visits to the space overnight, with students providing feedback that the availability of a dedicated study space makes a difference to their student experience.

### 5. **Peer Academic Mentoring**

Peer Academic Mentoring was available to students in-person and online throughout 2025, including evenings and weekends. The program provides students with opportunities to improve their academic content knowledge and study skills through individualised, peer-led sessions. In total, over 750 consultations were provided, assisting close to 500 students to build skills and confidence.

In 2025, the program was expanded to provide better support for Indigenous students by employing two Indigenous peer Academic Mentors. In addition, 12 mentors, from across the four faculties and at different stages of their academic journey, from undergraduates to Higher Degree by Research students, were employed by the program.

## 6. Library Makerspace

The Curtin Library Makerspace provides students with the opportunity to develop their creative and digital skills through a wide range of equipment and the support of specialised staff. Its facilities, made available at no cost to students, can be used for coursework or for the enjoyment of doing something new. SSAF funding enables the extension of the Makerspace's opening hours to include Saturday from 11am - 4pm during the two main semesters, providing access for students who cannot visit the space during its normal operating hours of 9am - 5pm, Monday to Friday.

In total, the Makerspace recorded 1,663 visits on Saturdays, with students expressing gratitude for the additional opportunities to access the service.

## **University - Sport & Recreation**

Curtin Sport and Recreation undertook ongoing consultation with students throughout the reporting year to inform the priorities, proposed heads of expenditure, and projects funded through Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) revenue. Student input was gathered through multiple structured and informal channels to ensure SSAF-funded programs and services reflected student needs and expectations.

Key consultation mechanisms included engagement with the Curtin University Students Sports Advisory Council (CUSSAC), which comprises student representatives appointed for the duration of the year. This forum provided direct and regular feedback on sport and recreation services and enabled students to contribute to discussions regarding priorities for SSAF-funded activities. In addition, program evaluation surveys were administered at the conclusion of SSAF-supported programs and services to assess student satisfaction, outcomes achieved, and areas for improvement. Ongoing feedback was also facilitated through feedback boxes located within Curtin Stadium and via email using publicly available stadium contact details.

All feedback received through these channels was systematically reviewed and considered by Curtin Sport and Recreation staff and used to inform program design, service improvements, and resource allocation decisions. This consultation process established clear student-driven priorities,

including maintaining accessible sport and recreation opportunities, enhancing participation programs, and supporting student wellbeing through high-quality facilities and services.

Curtin Sport and Recreation applied expenditure controls and governance processes aligned with Curtin policies and legislative requirements. Funds were allocated only to permitted SSAF categories, with ongoing oversight to confirm expenditure directly supported eligible student sport, recreation, and wellbeing activities.

In the reported year, SSAF funding enabled the delivery and continuation of a range of sport and recreation programs and services aligned with student-identified priorities. These investments contributed to increased participation opportunities, improved program quality, and enhanced student experience within Curtin's sport and recreation offerings.

## **University - Student Life and Community**

Student Life & Community secured funding for 6 initiatives in 2025 from Student Services and Amenities Fees

1. Orientation
2. Employment Ready Graduates
3. Students as Partners
4. Social Impact Hub
5. Curtin Extra
6. Curtin Community Pantry Vouchers

### **1. Orientation**

In 2025, Orientation delivered a comprehensive welcome experience across both Semester 1 and Semester 2 intakes, reaching an estimated 16,037 students. Delivery spanned the Bentley campus, the Kalgoorlie campus, and extended to Open Universities Australia students across four additional study periods, the latter a pilot that generated strong engagement and is already building momentum into 2026. Students were supported through general and course-specific sessions, campus tours, O-Week Festival activation zones, and a range of social events designed to

foster connection and belonging. The Bentley Extended Orientation programme, anchored by the Mentor Hub, offered continuity beyond the initial welcome period through initiatives like the Week 2 Street Party and mentor meet-and-greet events.

The New to Curtin Mentoring programme was fully delivered across multiple cohorts and study periods, exceeding its 5% participation growth target. All goals were completed across both semesters, and the programme closed the year on time and within budget. A digital onboarding enhancement project was also initiated, laying the groundwork for an improved orientation platform within OASIS in 2026.

## **2. Employment Ready Graduates**

SSAF contributed to the Careers and Employability services via the Employment Ready Graduates program. The services experienced measurable growth across employer engagement, student participation, and digital reach in 2025. On-campus employer events increased by 10.34% and off-campus events rose substantially, up 96.15% to 51 events. The Internship Gateway Programme saw employer participation more than double, growing by 112.5%, with student placements increasing by 38.5%. Industry Mentoring Programme applications rose by 48.44%, reaching 285 applicants. Jobs and Employability Week attracted 1,333 student participants, a 24% increase on the prior year. Digital platforms also performed well: UniHub careers resources drew over 8,800 views, VMock usage grew by 70%, and a newly launched LinkedIn channel attracted more than 1,500 followers. One-to-one career consultations increased by 10.51% to 2,181 sessions across 1,985 students, with an average satisfaction rating of 4.8 out of 5. Curriculum integration continued to deepen, with 8 new courses mapped to the Career Development Learning Framework in 2025, bringing the cumulative total since 2021 to 29 courses and 226 units.

## **3. Student as Partners**

Awareness of the Students as Partners (SaP) model was bolstered through a coordinated marketing campaign, an O-Week presentation to incoming students, and a full revision of student-facing and staff portal web content. Four SaP Leadership Group meetings were held, and the 2025 Annual Action Plan was developed in consultation with representatives from across the university. The Community of Practice continued to grow through regular workshops, and consultancy support was provided across more than 50 meetings with academic and professional staff to guide the planning and delivery of SaP-aligned initiatives. The Student Mentoring Staff project was delivered with confirmed participation from the Faculties of Business & Law and Health Sciences, as well as Student Life & Community and Student Success, generating positive feedback from participants. Curtin's inclusion on the Student Voice Australasia committee further reinforced its standing as a sector leader in the students as partners space.

#### **4. Social Impact Hub**

The Social Impact Hub delivered strong outcomes across volunteering, leadership, and social impact programming in 2025, completing six of its eight goals in full. Curtin Volunteers! engaged 592 students across Perth and Kalgoorlie, who collectively contributed over 6,372 volunteer hours through metropolitan, regional, online, and Indigenous-focused activities. Volunteer satisfaction sat at 94.6%, and all 98 student leadership positions recorded 100% leader satisfaction. Three Design Jams in partnership with non-profit and government partners engaged 67 students, with 100% satisfaction reported across the cohort. The Curtin Community Pantry successfully transitioned to a virtual model, supporting 242 students experiencing food insecurity. Skills for Success delivered 790 workshop attendances across 30 sessions, and the Curtin Leaders Program achieved an 87% completion rate across 33 participants. John Curtin Scholarship Program scholars participated in six professional development workshops, supported by an active mentoring programme. Externally, 78 unique partners were engaged across the year, and the CV! team received the VC Excellence Award for Excellence in Partnership, a notable recognition of the programme's collaborative reach and sector impact.

#### **5. Curtin Extra**

Curtin Extra delivered against three of its four goals in 2025, with the fourth - a full framework review and implementation - substantially progressed but pending formal sign-off on recommendations at year's end. Efforts were increased to raise awareness of the co-curricular framework and encouraging students to log their hours and share their achievements. Student completions of Curtin Extra approved programmes notably increased by 11%, more than doubling the original 5% growth target. Digital badge sharing rose by 13.2%, again well ahead of the 5% target set for the year. The comprehensive framework review was completed and recommendations developed; implementation will follow once endorsement is secured in 2026. Across the year, the programme reached an estimated 1,427 students, reinforcing Curtin Extra's role in formally recognising the co-curricular experiences that strengthen graduate employability.

#### **6. Curtin Community Pantry**

The Curtin Community Pantry Vouchers was an initiative that was funded by SSAF following additional funding becoming available throughout the year. In recognising the challenges that students face and increasing cost of living pressures, the vouchers provided low-barrier access to food support for students experiencing financial hardship or food insecurity. Approved mid-year the program funded 200 vouchers redeemable at Coles, Woolworths, or IGA, were purchased for the Student Wellbeing team to distribute to students on a priority basis following a basic needs assessment. The transition from a physical pantry model to a virtual voucher system, complemented by contributions from Curtin Advancement and the Curtin Cares initiative, ensured a more equitable and accessible distribution mechanism. All funding was utilised as planned.

## Student Guild

Curtin University and the Student Guild operate SSAF funding under the SSAF Expenditure and Guild Grants Agreement (The Agreement). Under the Agreement, the University forwards to the Guild 50% of the SSAF collected annually to enable the Guild to undertake student programs that are in accordance with Subsection 19-38(4) of the Higher Education Support Act 2003 (the Act). The Curtin Student Guild consults with their members each year before the Guild Council approves the allocation of the 50% SSAF revenue. Consistent with University projects noted above, Guild project proposals are then submitted to the SSAFEAC for approval. Monthly internal reporting of SSAF projects is provided to the Guild Council, and Quarterly progress reporting is provided to the SSAFEAC committee throughout the year as required.

The following Guild projects have been supported by SSAF in 2025:

1. Representing and Supporting Students included projects like:
  - a. Participation of student representatives on University Boards & Committees;
  - b. Representation provided to International, Postgraduate, Queer, Women, First Nations and students with disabilities;
  - c. Satellite campus support.
2. Student Assist – Continue the Guild’s Student Assist program which remains one of Australia’s best Student Assist programs. The program provides:
  - a. independent support, advice and information to students
  - b. independent welfare related services
  - c. subsidised access to short courses
3. Student Societies (Clubs) and Events - To continue to support and evolve the Guild’s clubs and events program.
  - a. clubs and Societies have a tremendous impact on student life, community, inclusivity and provide opportunities to grow through meeting and interacting with students of similar interests. In addition, clubs promote skills through their interactions with academia and industry. Crucially they serve as a platform for leadership and management skills for the students participating within them.
  - b. By providing activities and events, students become more engaged with the University and have the opportunity to meet others and de-stress. Events promoting particular equity groups help further Curtin’s goals of a culture of internationalisation and promoting social justice.
4. Guild Precinct Plan - This was the initial stage in a restructure of the Guild Precinct to make it fit for purpose.
